

- (0.0) 0.0 L on 115A, heading north from Applebrook.
- (0.5) 0.5 L onto Rt. 2 in Jefferson
- (0.4) 0.9 L on Rt 116 to next turn which is easy to miss since it is at the bottom of a hill.
- (5.1) 6.0 R on WHITEFIELD RD. Road is paved for 0.9 miles, then becomes dirt, slightly downhill for most of it. (To avoid dirt road, continue on R116S until Whitefield, and then take a right on Rt.3 to the state park entrance.
- (3.8) 9.8 R (North) on Rt. 3.
- (0.4) 10.2 R through gate of WEEKS STATE PARK. Paved road to summit with Mt. Prospect's east overlook on R at 1.1 miles. Gives drawing and labeling of 38 mountains of the presidential range. Continue up another 0.5 miles to summit.
- (1.6) 11.8 Memorial Building (\$2.50 entrance). Elevation 2058. Fire lookout tower. John Weeks State Historic site*. Great panoramic view on a clear day. After enjoying the Park, time go down hill.
- (0.1) to
- (1.6) 11.8 R (North) on Rt. 3 to Lancaster.
- (2.3) 15.7 BR towards Rte. 2
- (0.1) 15.8 R on Rte. 2
 [Alternative: continue on Rte. 3 and just before crossing over the Israel River, go R on Mechanic St., passing through covered bridge. This road merges into North Road which will come out on Rte. 2 eventually (take a left), and then R on 115A in Jefferson].
 () Rte. 3 in Lancaster to 115A/Rte.2 junction
- (0.5) R on 115A in Jefferson, returning to Applebrook.

H., the house and grounds provide a 360 degree panorama of mountain splendor, including the Presidential Range of the White Mountains, the Green Mountains of Vermont, the Kilkenny Range, the Percy Peaks, and the upper Connecticut River Valley...John W. Weeks was the person most directly responsible for the creation of forest reserves in the White Mountains."
